W4SSY Spud Gun Notes

My spud gun is no longer and as there has been several in need of one I thought I would share my notes.

Contains 2 links regarding the W4SSY design I used.

I did not want to use an electrical sprinkler valve preferring a 1" mechanical pvc globe valve with female threads each end to screw onto the male adapter threads. It can be unscrewed and changed to an electric sprinkler valve in the future as desired. I remember going through the whole bin to find the easiest turning globe valve as you have to rotate in open fast.

The pvc pipes are sold in short sections, 2 footers I think, typically the different sizes in a cardboard box. Aubuchons actually had a high pressure rated 3 inch pipe for the main chamber.

I remember having to go to Home Depot, Lowes, and Aubuchons to find all the parts and adapters.

I went to an auto parts store for the tire valve and there was a large and small one in the package. I used the larger one.

The reel was a Zebco 33 from Walmart. I liked its 15 lb red Cajun line as it has some visibility.

I remember drilling 2 small holes in the 3/4 end cap and inserting a piece of paper clip and twisting the ends together inside the cap before gluing to the 3/4 pipe projectile aka the bullet. The bullets need no weight inside. For visibility I did a couple of wraps of surveyors tape with a piece of clear tape to hold the end down.

I never used a fishing swivel on the fishing line for bullet attachment preferring to tie a large enough loop in the fishing line with one overhand knot. I would feed the loop through the bullets eyelet, loop it around the bullet, and slide it tight. Once removed from the bullet this same loop was used a foot up the twine. As one reels the twine up this knotless attachment slides well over branches. The twine/masons line is then used to pull the rope as the rope is too heavy to be reeled in with the fishing reel.

It is very convenient to get the appropriate size twine/masons line preinstalled on a plastic wind up reel. I got mine from Home Depot.

A bicycle pump with attached pressure gauge was used to fill the air chamber. I never over 60 psi as that easily cleared trees.
